I. War and Politics

A. Palestine

1. Al-Nakba (1948), 2013, Documentary series.

"The Nakba did not begin in 1948. Its origins lie over two centuries ago...."

A series on the Palestinian 'catastrophe' of 1948 that led to dispossession and conflict that still endures. So begins this four-part series on the 'Nakba,' meaning the 'catastrophe,' about the history of the Palestinian exodus that led to the first Arab Israeli war in 1948, and the beginning of the Israeli occupation to Palestine.

2. Resistance Why, 1971, Documentary.

In the title of the film, Ghazi asks about the resistance, its history, struggle, and importance, and examines the goals of the Palestinian struggle. All his interlocutors stressed the need for an independent and democratic Palestine to exist and defend it with arms. Why the Resistance has a rich archive of photos and scenes taken in Palestinian refugee camps. Ghazi drew us a map of Palestine and from it determined how Palestinians were expelled from their homes, whether by land or sea. The film brings the tradition of armed cinema (alternative or third) to Lebanon, creating through it the spirit of the Palestinian struggle and asking how, by reading the past, we know what is happening in the present.

In 1970, Christian Ghazi and Noureddine Chatti met with several Arab political figures, especially Palestinians living in Lebanon, resulting in this piece of armed (alternative or third) cinema that captures a crucial cross-section of the Palestinian resistance in Lebanon in 1970. The film features footage of Ghassan Kanafani, Sadiq Jalal El-Azm, Nabil Shaath and other personalities who share their vision of the Palestinian revolution, tracing its history back to the early 20th century. These testimonies describe the many strikes and popular protests that took place in Palestine under the Ottoman occupation, followed by the British colonization and the settlement of the Israeli state/occupation to Palestine in 1948. They enumerate the objectives of the struggle, emphasizing the necessity for a free and democratic Palestine, defended through armed or non-armed struggle by all its citizens, men, and women of various affiliations.

3. Women beyond boarders, 2004, Documentary.

The documentary explores the lives of three remarkable Palestinian women - Kifah Afifi, Fadwa Toukan, and Samiha Khalil - who defied societal norms and political barriers to carve out their own paths. Through their stories, the film underscores the importance of resilience, empowerment, and the pursuit of justice, all of which are integral to fostering democratic ideals within diverse communities. As agents of change, these women exemplify the potential for individuals to challenge systemic injustices and advocate for a more inclusive and equitable society, echoing the principles that underpin the research tool's mission.

The film explores the lives and works of some of the women who have joined in the fight for their Palestinian homeland. We learn of young resistance fighter Kifah Afifi's experience as a survivor of the 1982 Shatila massacre in Lebanon when she was just twelve years old. She tells about fighting the Israeli occupation of South Lebanon in the 1990s and of her imprisonment in the Khiam detention facility, which was run by Israel's occupation auxiliary militia, the South Lebanon Army.

Director Chamoun also explores the pioneering contributions of other Palestinian women, such as activist Samiha Khalil, also known as Um Khalil, who spoke out against the Balfour Declaration and the British occupation of Palestine at an international women's demonstration in 1936, when she was just thirteen years old. She founded the welfare organization Inaash al-Usra in her garage in 1965 and ran for president against Yasser Arafat in 1996, earning twelve percent of the vote.

Through the insightful dialogue between Bagdadi and Mikhail al-Neaimy, viewers are presented with a nuanced understanding of critical issues shaping the region's socio-political landscape. By delving into topics such as war, sectarianism, and education, "Ninety" offers a valuable resource for fostering dialogue and promoting awareness among the youth about the complexities of democracy and social justice within the Euromed context. The film features a long encounter by Bagdadi with Mikhail al-Neaimy, the Lebanese author. The latter answers the questions of Bagdadi about his private life, education, and ideas, about politics and the environment, Mount Lebanon, the war, women, and sectarianism

2. War on War, 1984, Film.

The movie depicts the devastating effects of war on a city and its people, illustrating the chaos, destruction, and suffering that result from violent conflict. By witnessing the aftermath of war through the camera's lens, viewers may gain

a deeper understanding of the human cost of conflict and the importance of seeking peaceful resolutions to societal disputes.

The camera wanders through streets standing witness to a war that has destroyed a city and an entire nation. Baghdadi goes to war against the Lebanese civil war, exploring different locations and situations in a country faced with its own demise. The poetic text raises questions of life and death through contrasting images of violent death and the will to live.

3. West Beirut, 1998, Feature film.

West Beirut follows the adventures of three teenagers - Tarek, Omar, and May - as they roam the streets of Beirut in 1975, during the early stages of the civil war. Through their eyes, the film captures the spirit of resilience, friendship, and hope amidst the chaos of war, highlighting the importance of individual agency and the pursuit of peace.

In April 1975, a young Lebanese boy named Tarek witnessed a massacre of Palestinians by the Phalangists. Shortly thereafter, the civil war breaks out; Beirut is partitioned along a line separating the Muslim-Christian mixed West Beirut from the quasi-Christian East Beirut. After the line was created, Tarek is now considered to live in West Beirut, as he is Muslim himself and is in high school, making Super 8 movies with his friend, Omar. At first the war was a lark, Tarek's school, situated in East Beirut, has closed and is no longer accessible to West Beirut residents, getting from West to East is impossible. His mother wants to leave the country, but his father refuses. Tarek spends time with May, an

orphaned Christian girl living in his building. By accident, Tarek goes to an infamous brothel in the war-torn Zeytouni Quarter, meeting its legendary madam, Oum Walid. He then takes Omar and May there. Family tensions rise.

Later, and as he comes of age, the war moves inexorably from adventure to a nationwide tragedy. A compilation of films and images from the war plays, showing Yasser Arafat, the Israeli invasion, Hafiz al-Assad, and the American intervention. The film ends with Tarek breaking down crying while listening to his father play a guitar, and remembering the good times he had before the war. West Beirut explores themes of democracy, conflict resolution, and inclusion through the lens of a coming-of-age story set during the Lebanese Civil War. It portrays the experiences of young people navigating the complexities of war-torn Beirut and seeking freedom and self-expression amidst political turmoil.

The film talks about the role that ordinary citizens play in shaping and securing their democracy through the story of three women who start a grassroots

movement (Shayfenkom) to educate and empower the public by raising awareness about the meaning of democracy during Egypt's first multi-party presidential election. Three women, unable to sit by while their country is on the brink of drastic change, start a grassroots movement to educate and empower the public by raising awareness about the meaning of democracy. 2. Tahrir: the good, the bad and politician, 2011, Documentary.

Tahrir 2011 documents the Egyptian revolution in Tahrir Square, specifically focusing on the passionate demonstrations that led to the arrest and trial of President Hosni Mubarak. Shot from the perspective of the demonstrators, the film captures the immediacy and intensity of the protests, showcasing the people's struggle for democracy and social justice. It also examines the violent response of the police towards the demonstrators and provides insight into Mubarak's regime and his tactics for retaining power. This documentary focuses on the events of the Egyptian revolution in Tahrir Square, portraying themes of democracy through peace and political inclusion, and communication.

The film showcases how the Egyptian people, through peaceful demonstrations and civil resistance in Tahrir Square, demanded democratic reforms and an end

to authoritarian rule under Hosni Mubarak. Despite facing violence and repression from the government, the protesters remained committed to achieving their goals through non-violent means, highlighting the power of peaceful resistance in promoting democratic change.

It portrays the diversity of the Egyptian population participating in the revolution, including individuals from different socioeconomic backgrounds, ages, and political affiliations. By following the stories of various demonstrators, the film illustrates how the movement for change transcended societal divisions and united people from all walks of life in their quest for political inclusion and representation.

The documentary captures the significance of communication and media in shaping public perception and mobilizing collective action during the revolution. It highlights the role of social media platforms and citizen journalism in disseminating information, organizing protests, and amplifying the voices of dissent against the Mubarak regime. Additionally, the film underscores the importance of effective communication within the protest movement itself, as demonstrators shared their grievances, demands, and aspirations for a more democratic Egypt.

4. The square, 2013, Documentary.

In February 2011, Egyptians, particularly young ones, showed the world the way people demanding change can drive an entire nation to transformation. The result was a profound movement toward democracy that is still evolving across the Arab world. A documentary that vividly captures the Egyptian Revolution of 2011, focusing on the intense struggle for democracy. It follows activists at Tahrir Square as they challenge authoritarian rule through largely peaceful protests, despite violent crackdowns. The film showcases the crucial role of social media and independent journalism in mobilizing support and highlights the diverse voices within the movement, including significant participation by women.

The Square, a film by Jehane Noujaim (Control Room; Rafea: Solar Mama), looks at the hard realities faced day-to-day by people working to build Egypt's new democracy. Catapulting us into the action spread across 2011 and 2012, the film provides a kaleidoscopic, visceral experience of the struggle. Cairo's Tahrir Square is the heart and soul of the film, which follows several young activists. Armed with values, determination, music, humor, an abundance of social media, and sheer obstinacy, they know that the thorny path to democracy only began

with Hosni Mubarak's fall. The life-and-death struggle between the people and the power of the state is still playing out.

D. Aftermath

1. La Haine, 1995, Drama.

Is a French drama that explores the lives of three young men in the aftermath of a riot in the Parisian suburbs. It focuses on their struggles with poverty, racism, and police brutality. The tensions between marginalized youth and authorities in suburban Paris. Its raw portrayal of social injustice and the struggles of disenfranchised communities.

 Social Unrest and Protests: Massive strikes and protests erupted across France in November and December 1995 in response to proposed government reforms to social welfare and pension systems by Prime Minister Alain Juppé. The strikes, involving millions of workers from various sectors, paralyzed transportation and public services, marking one of the largest waves of social unrest in France since May 1968.

- Rise of Extreme Right-Wing Politics: The 1995 presidential election saw the
 emergence of Jean-Marie Le Pen, leader of the far-right National Front
 party, as a significant political figure. Le Pen's strong showing in the first
 round of voting, where he secured nearly 15% of the vote, underscored
 growing concerns about immigration, nationalism, and xenophobia in
 French society.
- Paris Metro Bombing: In July 1995, a bomb exploded in the Paris Metro at the Saint-Michel station, killing eight people and injuring dozens more. The attack, attributed to the Armed Islamic Group (GIA), a militant Islamist organization, heightened fears of terrorism and prompted increased security measures in France and across Europe.

In the late 1960s, Dhofar revolted against the British-backed Sultanate of Oman, in a democratic, feminist guerrilla movement. Director Heiny Srour and her team capture this rare record of a now mostly forgotten war.

2. O Thiasos, 1975, Historical drama.

"O Thiasos" (The Travelling Players) is a Greek historical drama that follows a group of travelling actors who tour Greece between 1939 and 1952, during which the country experiences dictatorship, World War II, and the Civil War. 4. Underground, 1995, Comedy Drama.



Football gives women in Afghanistan the chance to build confidence and a new quality of life unknown to them before. Fear of attack is an ever-present threat. That is why the women's team is accompanied by security detail and train every other day on ISAF's military base in Kabul. Therefore, it is not unusual for the women to be forced to interrupt practice for the landing of a military helicopter at midfield. The young women's parents, while supporting their daughter's wishes to play football, are also concerned with their safety and future. In a patriarchal society, like Afghanistan, football is considered inappropriate for women. Between this tension of excitement for sports and the traditional roles that Afghan women have in society, rests my photography.

For the love of football, these women put their lives at risk. They learned to play in the Afghan women's national team. Sabera lives outside of Kabul. Every other day she makes a two-hour long journey through the perilous streets of Afghanistan. She says, "My parents have taken many risks, so I can play football. They support my wish, and our team provides information about women's football.



2. Kynodontas, 2009, Psychological thriller.

"Kynodontas" (Dogtooth) is a Greek drama film that tells the story of a dysfunctional family whose children are kept isolated from the outside world by their overprotective parents. The children are taught incorrect meanings for words, making it impossible for them to communicate properly with the outside world, should they ever try to escape.

Kynodontas is linked to the theme of democracy through its depiction of an authoritarian family structure that contrasts sharply with democratic ideals, highlighting the importance of freedom, gender equality, and inclusion by showcasing the extreme consequences of their absence. The film's exploration of controlled communication within the family underscores the value of open dialogue and conflict resolution. Its unique and provocative narrative, combined with its critical view of repressive environments, appeals to young audiences by challenging them to think critically about these significant social issues.

Key events:

In May 2021, Caroline Crouch, a 20-year-old British woman, was murdered in her home in Athens. Initially, her husband, Babis Anagnostopoulos, claimed that she was killed during a home invasion. However, it was later revealed that Anagnostopoulos himself had killed her and staged the robbery to cover up his crime. This case highlighted issues of domestic violence and the failure to protect victims within dysfunctional family settings.

In early 2022, the death of 9-year-old Georgina Daskalaki in Patras drew national attention. Her mother, Roula Pispirigou, was accused of poisoning her with ketamine. The case exposed severe family dysfunction and alleged long-term abuse. The investigation revealed a pattern of suspicious deaths within the family, raising concerns about child protection services and systemic failures in identifying and preventing familial abuse.

Although the initial crime occurred in 2018, the ongoing legal proceedings and societal impact were prominent through 2021 and 2022. Eleni Topaloudi, a university student on the island of Rhodes, was raped and murdered by two young men. The case underscored the pervasive issues of gender-based violence and the need for better support systems for young women facing abuse within dysfunctional family environments. It led to widespread public outcry and calls for legal reforms to protect victims of domestic and gender-based violence.

With his family grappling with extreme poverty, forever indebted to their ruthless landlord, the sad twelve-year-old boy, Zain, is forced to fend for himself in the squalid and overcrowded slums of Beirut. Unable to save his eleven-year-old sister, Sahar, from an uneasy arrangement, Zain will soon find himself all alone in a faceless city, ending up at a small amusement park to befriend another lost soul: the Ethiopian cleaner and mother of one, Rahil. But, in this grim and hostile world, there is no room for dreamers--and as a horrifying discovery is the last straw--a rabid desire for retribution possesses Zain and his bloodthirsty knife demands justice. Who is to blame when love becomes hate, and life turns into an unendurable torment?


